



Calling Students to School



Freemasons have always emphasized the importance of education. They believe in pursuing knowledge and self-improvement. In California, Masons started the first public school system and have continued to encourage lodges to be an active part of our communities and school programs.

In early Los Angeles,


Dr. Thomas Foster was a physician and responsible for the first schoolhouse to be built at Spring and Second Streets. Foster served as the 6th Mayor of Los Angeles. Thomas Foster was a member of Los Angeles Masonic Lodge No. 42.

Jean Louis Vignes (1780 – 1862) He also contributed to the founding of the first Los Angeles public school. At his El Alizo winery he was the first commercial wine maker in California. Jean Louis Vignes was a member of Los Angeles Lodge No. 42.

Dr. Walter Lindley (1852–1922) He oversaw development of early medical and educational institutions. Lindley became the city health officer in 1879. Established the first system of births and deaths and set up a free vaccination program. Dr. Lindley was a member of Signet Chapter, No. 57, Royal Arch Masons.



Signers of the Declaration of Independence included eight who were Freemasons. The United States Constitution was signed by thirteen members of Masonic Lodges. 33 Generals of the Continental Army were Freemasons.



While this month we are ringing in the New Year of 2025, let's take a moment to commemorate the generosity of Scottish Rite Masons in California who, more than a century ago, worked tirelessly to raise money to create a silver bell to symbolize the unity and brotherhood of mankind.

Inspired by Albert Pike's dream of expanding the Scottish Rite in the West, an organizational meeting took place in 1885 at 125 North Main Street in Los Angeles which today is just steps away from LA's iconic City Hall. Within two years, the Scottish Rite Bodies relocated to a new temple at First and Spring Streets for the next decade.

Through the decades the bell was installed in various LA Scottish Rite buildings and eventually was placed in the Los Angeles Scottish Rite's current location in Santa Monica where it was tragically and mysteriously stolen.

"...from 2,350 contributions of silver of much sentimental and historical value, donated by the Brethren of the Scottish Rite Bodies in the Valley of Los Angeles, Orient of California, and is intended to be permanently used in their cathedral..."
